Mission Statement

The National Black Chamber of Commerce is dedicated to economically empowering and sustaining African American communities through entrepreneurship and capitalistic activity within the United States and via interaction with the Black Diaspora.

The National Black Chamber of Commerce was incorporated in Washington, DC in March 1993. This business association represents 95,000 Black owned businesses and provides an advocacy that reaches all 1 million Black owned businesses.

The NBCC is a nonprofit, nonpartisan, nonsectarian organization dedicated to the economic empowerment of African American communities. 190 affiliated chapters are locally based throughout the nation as well as international affiliated chapters based in Bahamas, Brazil, Colombia, France, Ghana and Jamaica and businesses as well as individuals who may have chosen to be direct members with the national office.

When the NBCC was founded, there were 300,000 African American businesses with annual sales of \$30 billion a year. Today, there are 1,000,000 African American businesses doing \$88 billion a year and African American consumers have a buying power of \$950 billion a year, according to the United States Census.
